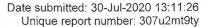

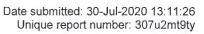

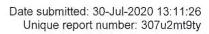

During this reporting period Evolution has commenced a partnership with Work 180 and are actively developing a range of new strategies to attract women to Evolution Mining. Additionally, we are thrilled that for the third year in succession we have secured gender equality in our graduate program. We discovered through our analysis of the graduate recruitment process that only 30% of our applicants are women but they are securing 50% of the roles. We are further pleased to report that the two newest members of our General Manager community are women and we are confident that the appointment of women to senior leadership roles will have a positive impact on this commitment.
